# \$1.3 million for non-fatal drowning research

The Drowning Prevention Research Centre Canada (DPRC) - the lead agency for drowning and waterincident research in Canada - is investing \$1.3 million over the next three years to develop the partnerships and processes required to collect, analyze and report on nonfatal drownings in Canada.

Since 1987, data on Canadian drowning and waterrelated fatalities has been collected from the offices of the chief coroners/medical examiners across the country. The Lifesaving Society publishes its Canadian Drowning Report and individual provincial drowning reports based on this data.

In 2013, the DPRC inaugurated a new web-based database – a comprehensive database of drownings in Canada. The database provides a link between the data from current year media and Internet reports and the data collected from provincial and territorial coroner's offices. The program reports on numerous factors collected on each drowning, which facilitates the identification of high-risk groups and provides the data required to create campaigns targeting risky behaviour.

The DPRC will be working toward the same level of sophistication in the development of a comprehensive database on non-fatal drowning and will be learning from and working with experts in Canada and in other countries with knowledge and experience in non-fatal drowning data collection.

## **New funding for Swim to Survive Plus**

The Ministry of Education has confirmed funding for the Swim to Survive+ School Grant Program for the next two school years (2017-18 and 2018-19). This funding is in addition to the funding support the program receives from PPL Aquatic, Fitness and Spa Group.

Swim to Survive+ focuses on teaching Grade 7 students the three skills required to survive an unexpected fall into water - while wearing clothes as well as basic physical fitness concepts and how to help others struggling in deep water. The program is comprised of three in-class and three in-water lessons. Materials are available for classroom teachers and swim instructors.

This new funding allows the Lifesaving Society to target those at greatest risk including schools with large populations of newcomers, indigenous and lower socioeconomic status students.

Only current Lifesaving Society Trainers and Trainer candidates are eligible to attend the Trainer Update Clinic. Trainer candidates are individuals who have attended an Instructor Trainer Clinic but who have not yet completed the apprenticeship requirements for Trainer certification.



#### **WCDP2017**

The World Conference on Drowning Prevention (WCDP) (#wcdp2017) wrapped up in Vancouver on October 21. It was the most well attended WCDP ever with 805 participants (300 from Canada) from 60 countries.

The WCDP brings together the world's foremost experts on drowning prevention, rescue, lifesaving and water safety, and fosters a feeling of mutual commitment to ending the drowning problem through shared ideas and strategic partnerships. A range of issues were examined over four plenary sessions, 253 break-out session presentations, four workshops and 91 presentations over the three-day conference.

Speaker highlights included Tima Kurdi, who spoke eloquently about the link between refugees and drowning. (The photos of her two-year-old nephew Aylan, a Syrian refugee who washed up on a Greek beach, shocked the world and conveyed the impact of war.) Dr. Wendy Lai

from Médecins Sans Frontiers encouraged us to look at the causes of drowning, including refugees. Thirteen-year-old youth representative Schuyler Bankes reminded attendees of their responsibility to the youth of the world.

This was the first time the WCDP was hosted in Canada. Conference planning was led by Lifesaving Society BC and Yukon Branch Executive Director Dale Miller, his staff, and an enthusiastic group of volunteers. The World Health Organization (WHO), represented by Dr. David Meddings, co-sponsored the conference. Bloomberg Philanthropies along with the Princess Charlene of Monaco Foundation supported the conference financially. Lifesaving Ontario provided scholarships to 46 individuals to attend the conference.

The following Ontario representatives were presenters at the conference: Barbara Byers, Tessa Clemens, Adrian Cossu, Kathleen Finn, Michael Shane, Christine Wagg and Tanya Wolsegger.

The next WCDP will be held in Durban, South Africa in October 2019.
