How to become an **Examiner Mentor**

Examiner Mentors are senior Lifesaving Society Examiners appointed by the Society's Area Chairs to mentor examiner candidates through their apprenticeship phase and approve them for examiner certification.

When working with an apprenticing examiner candidate, the Examiner Mentor is responsible for the smooth conduct of the examination, and only the Examiner Mentor (as the examiner of record) has the authority to make pass/fail decisions and sign test sheets.

This dual responsibility – evaluation of the award candidates while supervising and evaluating an apprentice examiner – is a challenging but rewarding experience.

Prerequisites: Examined a minimum of three exams in a specific stream.

Process:

- 1. Application Complete the application form and return it to the Lifesaving Society office.
- 2. **Learning Opportunity** If approved, an area chair will be in touch to arrange the learning opportunity.
- 3. **Assessment** After completing the learning opportunity the area chair will complete an assessment to determine if they are going to appoint you as an Examiner Mentor.

Required references: Examiner Handbook.

Costs: There is no fee for appointment as an Examiner Mentor.


Candidate recognition: Examiner Mentor appointment will appear on your Find a Member record.

Recertification: Only current Examiner Mentors may appoint candidates as an examiner. Remain current by recertifying within 24 months of the last certification date. Recertification is through the Society's professional development credit system.


NEW TRAINER MANUAL NOW AVAILABLE

Orillia gets creative: offers lifeguard training for high school credits

Lifeguards put in a ton of hours to earn their certifications. Have you ever wondered: "wouldn't it be great if I could get a high school credit for all this hard work?" In Orillia, you can.

The Orillia Parks, Recreation and Culture Department, in partnership with the Simcoe Muskoka Catholic District School Board and the Orillia YMCA, came up with a program where students earn a high school credit for completing Bronze Medallion, Bronze Cross, Standard First Aid, Lifesaving Assistant Instructor and High Five Principles of Healthy Child Development.

The program was developed by Christine Mitchell, former aquatics and fitness supervisor for the City of Orillia, who devised the program as a means of lifequard recruitment. The program targets 14 to 16-year-old students and currently has 23 students enrolled.

Orillia also has a new course called "Career Aquatics," geared towards 16 to 18-year-olds that will begin in the fall. Career Aguatics will include National Lifeguard – Pool, Lifesaving Society Swim and Lifesaving Instructor certifications in addition to the courses above, plus two co-op credits (i.e., work experience in aquatics).

Toronto kids Swim to Survive

The City of Toronto believes that teaching children basic swimming survival skills can help provide lifelong immunization against drowning.

In 2012, as part of the city's Recreation Service Plan, City Council unanimously approved the expansion of Swim to Survive to all 22,000 Grade 4 students in the Toronto District School Board and the Toronto Catholic District School Board by 2021.

The city currently donates all of the required pool time and a portion of instructor costs to facilitate the program. In the 2018/19 school year more than 15,000 students have participated so far, and the city is well on its way to reaching its goal of 22,000. Toronto's commitment is a big reason why Swim to Survive will reach more than 100,000 Ontario students this school year.

The Lifesaving Society is proud of the City of Toronto and its commitment to drowning prevention.

The Ontario Waterfront Safety Standards will assist waterfront owners and operators in providing a safe aquatic environment for their patrons. The publication explains the Society's position on waterfront safety issues and informs owners and operators about safety expectations as a preventive measure before drownings occur. It offers recommendations for minimum standards of operation for waterfront facilities where the public is admitted for aquatic activity.

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Examiner Certification Process

Examiner Course

Passed the Examiner Course

Attended an Examiner Standards Clinic (prior to 2019)

Experienced Instructor

Taught or co-taught a minimum of one course in the stream you are seeking certification in:

Bronze Examiner = Bronze Medallion or Bronze Cross course

First Aid Examiner = Standard First Aid course

National Lifeguard Examiner = National Lifeguard course

Successful Apprenticeship

Successfully apprentice with an Examiner Mentor on a minimum of one exam in the stream in which you seek examiner certification.

Certification

Submit examiner certification fee with completed Examiner Training Record to the Lifesaving Society office.

As of January 1, 2019, the Examiner certification fee is \$15.45. Examiner candidates submit this fee with their completed Examiner Training Record (downloadable from Find a Form at lifesavingsociety.com).

When recertifying multiple leadership awards (including Examiner) at the same time, the Examiner pays \$29.35 for the first leadership award recertified and \$8.75 for each additional award (to a max. of \$60.00).
